Resource Spotlight: eBooks

The Technical Library provides access to over 50,000 eBooks, from 11 publishers, in most subject areas (plus an additional 8,000+ Open Access titles from eight publishers). The easiest way to find them is by going to the eBooks tab on the library homepage, and typing in a word from the title. From the results page that comes up, you can narrow your search by vendor. We also provide access to [Safari eBooks](#), through individual subscriptions. For less than \$20/month, you have access to over 40,000 titles from over 30 publishers covering technology, digital media and professional development topics—and you can access these on mobile devices as well.
