NIH Informationist Grants


NIH Administrative Supplement [Funding Opportunity Announcement](#): Eligible NIH awardees who are interested in integrating an informationist into their research team (1) to enhance collaborative, multi-disciplinary basic and clinical research by integrating an information specialist into the research team in order to improve the capture, storage, organization, management, integration, presentation and dissemination of biomedical research data; and (2) to assess and document the value and impact of the informationist's participation. Informationists bring a unique perspective on the acquisition, synthesis, management and use of information in research, working as team members with research scientists and health professionals, and are sometimes called in-context or 'embedded' information specialists. Application deadline is July 17, 2015. Historically, grants have been \$20-35K over two years.
