ACS Style Guide

You can now access the [ACS Style Guide](#) from the Technical Library [website](#). Besides being the standard citation style for chemistry, the Guide expertly addresses such topics as the editorial process, copyright, and writing style and can help any scientist communicate more effectively.

New Patent search tool


Innography's [PatentScout](#) is available to all PNNL staff, courtesy of Technology Commercialization. Using your email address to [log in](#), you can begin searching critical patent data from a private, secure web-based platform--so there's no risk of exposing potential IP strategy. Search for patents using keyword or semantic search; download results in Microsoft Office or Adobe PDF. In order to access the site you will need to allow cookies. PatentScout is accessible from the [Technical Library](#) website via Primo or the Databases tab. New Journals from Science and Nature




Nature Publishing Group has launched a new journal, *Nature Energy*, and Science is adding two new titles to begin publication in 2016, *Science Immunology* and *Science Robotics*. These will require subscriptions, but all are offering free access in their early months of publication. Please check them out and send any feedback to the [Technical Library](#).

[Science Immunology](#) facilitates understanding of the immune system by showcasing advances in the expanding field of immunology. The journal draws from studies in all organisms and model systems, including humans, and offers a generous selection of articles on cancer immunology. They are accepting manuscript submissions this spring; **first issue scheduled for publication July 2016**. The journal will be available to individuals and institutions through a **free trial from launch until the end of the year**.



[Science Robotics](#) promotes advances in research and development of robotics by providing a central forum for the most exciting new discoveries. The journal covers robotics and associated advances in materials research, artificial intelligence, sensors, and human-machine interaction. Environments range from the human body to the factory, and from sea to space. Science Robotics will also start accepting manuscripts this spring, with **first issue scheduled for September 2016; a free trial will be offered from launch till the end of the year**.

Each journal is expected to publish upwards of 150 original, peer-reviewed research articles per year, all with the same intellectual rigor found in *Science* itself.



Nature Energy free trial until March 20: Take advantage of trial access to [Nature Energy](#) through March 20. Although this journal is not yet indexed in Web of Science or Scopus, the articles published in this new journal are getting a lot of buzz in social media. Altmetric results can be seen for each article.

Service Spotlight: Fastest path to the (virtual) Library

One-click connect: By adding the [Technical Library](#) to the customizable left nav on the LabWeb homepage, you are just one click from your gateway to thousands of journals and books, databases, the Library's discovery tool Primo, and more. Go to the 'MyLinks' section on LabWeb's left navigation bar, click on the 'MyLinks' Edit button, insert the Library's URL, <http://library.pnl.gov>, and label it.


ORCID@PNNL: How do I get an ORCID?

It takes about 30 seconds to register for an ORCID: Simply go to <http://orcid.org/> and click on "[Register now!](#)". Fill in the blanks (name, email and password), select your "default privacy" setting (more to come on this), check that you're not a robot & consent to terms of use, and you're set. You'll get a long (16-digit!) number with a URL for your account.*

You can stop here, and you'll have an ORCID to use on manuscripts, proposals and association renewals. But to really tap into the benefits that an ORCID can provide, you'll need to complete your profile—this is a lot easier & quicker than you might think! You can copy and paste work history, education, etc. from CVs etc., and you can upload your publications list from Web of Science, Scopus or EndNote.
