Resources Spotlight: PAGESbeta from OSTI, Safari Books, Journal “Watch list”

PAGES (Public Access Gateway for Energy & Science) is the place to go when you are looking for a recent article that may not be included in our subscriptions. More specifically, it’s “a portal to journal articles and accepted manuscripts resulting from DOE-funded research”, the DOE response to the White House memo of February 2013 tasking federal science agencies with increasing access to peer-reviewed scientific publications. As a hybrid public access model, PAGES provides centralized metadata with decentralized full-text access to articles or accepted manuscripts, hosted by publishers and DOE-funded labs and other institutions. **(NOTE: you can search by ORCID ID!)**

SAFARI books online: Time to renew (or start a new subscription)! For less than \$165/person/year, you get access to full text of over 47,000 books and 3,800 videos on technology, science & engineering, IT and digital media, professional development and more (with more content all the time), accessible 24/7. Journals “Watch List”. Due to escalating journal prices and declining budgets, the library is constantly evaluating journal usage, and places journals on a “watch list” when usage drops. These journals are currently being “watched”: [Health Physics](#) (access via [library website](#)), [Microbiology](#), [Nanotoxicology](#), and [Radiation Research](#). Service Spotlight: Citation Search Report

Have you requested a Citation Search Report, and wondered what exactly that is? To create a Citation Search Report, librarians start by searching Web of Science on the author's name (a current CV is always helpful, but a current ORCID profile is even better! Email orcid@pnnl.gov if you'd like to learn more). We look at each publication in Web of Science to find all the times it was cited—even incorrectly (you'd be surprised!)—and for most reports, we also check Google Scholar for comparison. Tallying up all of the citations, we list all the papers that comprise the “*h*-index” (*n* papers cited *n* times), and then we analyze these citations by publication, country, indicating any “highly cited” or “hot” papers citing their works, and finally graph both publications and citations over time. We also include an analysis of journal impact for their top journals.

ORCID@PNNL Count: We now have just over **300** (known) ORCID IDs at PNNL. If you have not registered yet, go to www.orcid.org and get your own ORCID ID, then email orcid@pnnl.gov with your number*. Our goal is 500 ORCIDs before FY17, so every ORCID counts!

Dates for new ORCID registrations as well as follow-up sessions will also be included in a new ORCID@PNNL newsletter (first issue coming soon!). We are working on a more complete website, and hope to have a rollout in early June. One of the pages will feature ORCID@PNNL “Wall of Famers”. If you have completed your profile and would like to be listed here, send your link to ORCID@pnnl.gov.




Fig. 2. Bicycle (Hochrad) von 1880.


